Barnett and to this union were born nine children, Grace, Verna and Lee having preceded him in death.He leaves to morn his departure, his wife, and seven children, Mamie White of Michigan, Cecil Brown of Kokomo, Roy Dye of Hemlock, Iona Lynas of Lincoln, Emmel, William and Imogene, who still remain with their mother, also a brother at Bennett's Switch, and a sister at Sweetser, and many friends. Early in life he took up the blacksmith trade which he pursued until his health compelled him to quit. He united with the M.E. church early, but during his residence in Galveston he was gloriously converted to God and until his health failed him, he was an active worker in the church, being class leader, Sunday school superintendent and chorister.
